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

Melissa Fung Returns

On September 9th at St. John's United Church with 110 people in attendance, CSAW hosted a Breaking Bread with Melissa Fung as the keynote speaker. You may recall Melissa Fung was the former CBC journalist who was kidnapped and held for 30 days in Afghanistan in 2008. She wrote a book about her ordeal entitled '**Under an Afghan Sky.**' Melissa, wowed the audience with her personal story of returning to Afghanistan in 2013 (the first since her kidnapping) along with volunteer members of CW4WAfghan including our own Linda Middaugh. The 15 minute documentary, 'Return to Afghanistan' which was originally shown nationally on the CBC Nightly News was also part of the evening's program. The host for the evening was former anchor at CHCH TV in Hamilton, Connie Smith.

Melissa's story inspired two separate groups of women in the audience to organize Breaking Bread fundraising events. Sufficient funds, \$4,000 in total, were raised to train 10 teachers through the Lantern Fund.

In September 2014, two friends and I heard Melissa Fung speak at a meeting of Canadians Supporting Afghan Women (CSAW) in Oakville, ON. Her presentation was very enlightening but when she mentioned "Breaking Bread Together" in support of the Lantern Fund to pay for the training of female teachers, I started to think about how I could participate in that project. During the drive back to Rockwood, my friends and I discussed how and when we could also sponsor a Pot Luck Breaking Bread dinner and evening. November 14 was decided upon and we moved ahead.

In the end we hosted a very successful evening. Linda Middaugh from CSAW spoke passionately about her experiences in Afghanistan and you could have heard a pin drop in the room. Everyone listened attentively. There were 20 of us in attendance and several others mailed cheques to me as they were unable to attend in person. Our fundraising efforts netted a total of \$1200.00 so we were very thrilled with the results. This money will pay for the training of 3 teachers, which is very gratifying indeed.

In addition there was a lot of activity in Barbara's Afghan Marketplace and a number of people were able to purchase items as Christmas gifts as well as for themselves.

Further, there was interest from two attendees in organizing speaking engagements in a church and one for girls in a High School. I could not have dreamed of a better outcome.

Master Teachers' Workshops

In Malala Yousafzai's words, "A pen and a book can change the world." To that end CW4WAfghan has launched the Lantern Fund, the goal of which is to provide teacher education and training for 5,000 in-service teachers, 2,500 of whom will be female, in rural Afghanistan over the five-year period 2013-2018. The teachers registered in the program are trained in active learning methods with a heavy emphasis on math and science as well as social studies and language learning, utilizing highly qualified Afghan Master Teacher Trainers. Upon

successful completion of training, teachers are then certified by the Afghan Ministry of Education. Already established in and around Kabul, the FANOOS program will extend into the Kandahar area this year. CSAW, the Oakville chapter of CW4WAfghan, is dedicating a large portion of the proceeds from its fundraising activities in support of the Lantern Fund as we believe that education is one of the keys towards peace for the Afghan people. It costs \$400 to train one teacher and to date CSAW has raised \$22,450. - enough to train 56 teachers.
